Postpartum Plan

Some questions to be answered when preparing your postpartum plan include:


- Who will help in the first week(s) after birth? (making meals, doing laundry, housekeeping)
- Who will be the baby's health care provider?
- Who will evaluate the baby at 3-4 days of age? When and where is the appointment?
- Will your baby be breastfed or formula fed? If breastfeeding supplies are needed, where would you go?
- What are your wishes and expectations about visitors in the hospital or at home? Whom will you want to see? Whom do you not want to see? How can you restrict visitors when you are tired and frazzled?
- Who could you ask to help if you need emotional help? Who could help if you need someone to care for the baby while you get more sleep?
- What preparations and equipment are needed for the baby? (car seat, crib or bassinet, baby's room, clothing, and so on)
- Will you work outside the home after the baby is born? If so, when will you go back to work? Who will provide child care when both parents are at work?
